It sounds so simple, yet it will make things run much more smoothly. **However**, I strongly suggest that you scroll a little further to the right and remember to assess the **very important Phonological Awareness measures (including the "optional PA")** since they assess students on being able to hear those larger, more foundational pieces of PA! (Great info to have if they're struggling in PA.)

## Discovery

Get your students digging, pinching, sorting, counting, and more with an Apple Tree Sensory

Bin! Fill your bin with uncooked oats or rice, pompoms of red, green, and yellow, scoops of different sizes, large plastic tweezers, and apple trees ready for sorting! All you need for the trees are toilet tissue or paper towel tubes, green foam paper or sturdy (laminated) construction paper, and colored circles of red and yellow to add to the trees. Label

the trees with the color word, and let the students explore their apple orchard!

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## Letter Knowledge

Practice letter knowledge skills with the <u>Apple</u> <u>Basket Letter Sort.</u> This file provides apples with straight-line and curved-line letters and "basket" mats to support talking about the shapes of letters. This sounds so simple, but it's so important when teaching letter knowledge! Sort the letters according to those with only straight lines and only curved lines. (The file also includes numerals 0-10 so there is an opportunity to work on sorting letters vs. numerals.) TPGs included!

Hint: Be sure to print in landscape mode!





## Social & Emotional

We know that we can't teach knowledge and skills to students who are not ready socially and emotionally. This could change day-to-day with our young scholars. Often, we have no idea what baggage our students are carrying that impacts their learning while they are in our classroom. Perhaps if we knew when a student was struggling, we could provide additional support to help him/her find success in the midst of hard times. A simple (yet impactful) way to do this is to communicate with families. SIMPLE?! you say? Well, yes... If we set the expectation early with families. Print and send home THIS NOTE so families know that if/when tough times happen, you will be sure to "Handle with Care."

## Language & Literacy

Fingerplays, songs, and rhymes are vital to language and literacy instruction! They help students learn the sounds of words and to hear the rhythm of language. They teach vocabulary in a fun and playful way. Fingerplays support students' growth in both large and small motor skills by performing the movements that go along with with words. Memory and social skills are also learned by participating in fingerplays, songs and rhymes. So, turn off the screens for "music & movement" time and bring back the "old school" (developmentally appropriate) teaching method of incorporating songs and fingerplays during your whole group/Circle Time.














#### I Can Handle It!

Help your students feel emotionally strong along with Sebastien, and provide a tool to help them get through


challenging times.


